REVISED CLASS III AND IV PRICE FORMULAS FOR ALL FEDERAL MILK ORDERS

The United States Department of Agriculture has announced the final decision to amend the pricing formulas for milk marketed for manufacturing use under all federal milk marketing orders. The amended formulas use market prices of dairy products to establish minimum prices for milk used in the production of Class III products (cheese) and Class IV products (butter, dry milk products).

The final decision culminates a process that began with the 1996 Farm Bill. Historically, USDA established minimum prices for milk used in manufacturing by surveying the prices paid for manufacturing grade milk by unregulated plants in Minnesota and Wisconsin. However, by the late 1990s, declining supplies of manufacturing grade milk necessitated that a new procedure be developed to determine the value of milk used in manufacturing. As part of a comprehensive effort to consolidate and reform federal milk marketing orders under the 1996 Farm Bill, USDA developed pricing formulas for Class III and Class IV milk based on wholesale prices of manufactured dairy products. These pricing formulas were implemented on January 1, 2000, as required by the 1996 Farm Bill.

Congress mandated that USDA review the pricing formulas following the reform effort. A public hearing was held May 8-12, 2000, to consider proposals to change the formulas. Effective January 1, 2001, USDA issued revised formulas that were enjoined by a U.S. District Court at the end of January. In October 2001, following the court injunction, USDA issued a recommended decision again altering the pricing formulas. The final decision makes several minor changes in the recommended decision.

This final decision differs from the recommended decision by modifying the Class III and Class IV formulas to recognize the loss of milk during delivery from farm to plant. As proposed in the recommended decision, the make allowance for dry whey is increased from \$0.140 to \$0.159 per pound. All other make allowances remain unchanged.

The final decision was published in the November 7 *Federal Register*. The final decision would amend all federal milk orders. Each amended federal order must be approved by either two-thirds of producers supplying milk to the federal order or by producers who supply two-thirds of the milk to the federal order. The National Dairy Promotion and Research Board, composed of 36 dairy farmers representing 13 regions of the contiguous United States, administers a coordinated program of promotion, research and nutrition education.

The board was established by the Dairy Production Stabilization Act of 1983. It is authorized to design programs to strengthen the dairy industry's position in domestic and foreign markets. The national program is financed by a mandatory 15-cent per hundredweight assessment on milk produced in the contiguous 48 states and marketed commercially by dairy farmers. USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service monitors the operation of the board.

AMS encourages all eligible individuals to participate in its committee and board activities. It is USDA's policy that membership on industry-governed boards and committees accurately reflect the diversity of individuals served by the programs.

The Producer Butterfat Price of \$1.0726 per pound increased 6.27 cents from September 2002 and is down 58 cents from a year ago. The Protein Price of \$2.1839 is up 11.93 cents from last month and is down 48.25 cents from October 2001. The Other Solids Price in October was \$0.0755 per pound, an increase from last month's price of \$0.0367 and a decrease of 7.27 cents from last October. The Somatic Cell Adjustment rate for September was \$0.00060.

October producer receipts of 1.47 billion pounds were up 5.1 percent from September 2002, and increased 3.2 percent from October 2001 production of 1.42 billion pounds. Producer milk allocated to Class I accounted for 40.1 percent of the total producer milk in October 2002, higher than the 38.7 percent in September and lower than the 41.6 in October 2001. A total of 10,955 producers were pooled on the Mideast Order with an average daily delivery of 4,328 pounds compared to 11,174 producers pooled in October 2001 with an average daily delivery of 4,113 pounds.

The market average content of producer milk was as follows: Butterfat 3.73 %; Protein 3.10 %; Other Solids 5.69 % and Nonfat Solids 8.79 %.

SEPTEMBER MILK PRODUCTION UP 3.3 PERCENT

Milk production in the 20 major States during September totaled 11.8 billion pounds, up 3.3 percent from September 2001. August revised production, at 12.2 billion pounds, was up 4.1 percent from August 2001. The August revision represented an increase of 0.2 percent or 27 million pounds from last month's preliminary production estimate.

Production per cow in the 20 major States averaged 1,510 pounds for September, 38 pounds above September 2001.

The number of milk cows on farms in the 20 major States was 7.79 million head, 56,000 head more than September 2001, and 4,000 head less than August 2002.

The Mideast Marketing Area has four states represented in the 20 major states used above. They are Indiana, Michigan, Ohio, and Pennsylvania. Milk production in these Mideast states during September totaled 1.9 billion pounds, up 0.7 percent from September 2001.

Production per cow in the Mideast states averaged 1,446 pounds for September, 28 pounds above September 2001.

The number of cows on farms in the Mideast states was 1.3 million head, 10,000 head less than September 2001.
