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CHANGES IN CLASS III AND IV PRICE FORMULAS FOR ALL FEDERAL MILK ORDERS IMPLEMENTED

The final decision to amend the pricing formulas for milk marketed for manufacturing use under all federal milk m arketing orders became effective with milk m arketed in A pril. The amended formulas use market prices of dairy products to establish minimum prices for milk used in the production of Class III products (cheese) and Class IV products (butter, drymilk products).

This final decision differs from the recommended decision by modifying the Class III and Class IV formulas to recognize the loss of milk during delivery from farm to plant. As proposed in the recommended decision, the make allowance for dry w hey is increased from \$0.140 to \$0.159 perpound. All other make allow ances remain unchanged.

TEST RESULTS ON REDESIGNED CARD

The Mark et Adm inis trator labora tory will discontinue the use of the multi-colored postcard to notify nonmember producers' of their component test results. The use of a redesigned postcard is scheduled to begin in May. This change was necessitated by the large number of samples being tested beginning in 2003. Testing for nonmem ber producers was expanded from one sample each week (for everyother-day shippers) to every available sample. Every-other-day shippers will have 12 to 14 samples tested each month. Every-day shippers will have a significantly larger number of tests per month. This new format will allow up to 90 tests to be posted on a single notification, the old postcard could accommodate only 15 test results.

The passcode for the autom ated retrieval system will rem an unchanged. Producers will also be able to retrieve test results via email. FEBRUARY MILK PRODUCTION UP 1.7 PERCENT

Milk production in the 20 major States during February totaled 11.6 billion pounds, up 1.7 percent from February 2002. January revised production, at 125 billion pounds, was up 1.8 percent from January 2002. The January revision represented a increase of 1 million pounds from last month's preliminary production estimate.

Production per cow in the 20 major States averaged 1,485 pounds for February,13 pounds above February 2002.

The number of milk cows on farms in the 20 major States was 7.81 million head, 66,000 head more than February 2002, and 3,000 head more than January 2003.

The Mideast Marketing Area has four states represented in the 20 major states used above. They are Indiana, Michigan, Ohio, and Pennsylvania. Milk production in these Mideast states during Febru ary totaled 1.9 billion pounds, down 0.3 percent from Febru ary 2002.

Production percow in the Mideast states averaged 1,435 pounds for February,7 pounds above February 2002.

The number of cows on farms in the Mideast states was 1.3 million head, 1,000 head more than February 2002.

GROWTH OF FEDERAL MILK ORDER MARKETS

A chart on page three measures the grow thin Federal MilkOrder Markets for selected years from 1947-2002. The number of markets peaked in 1962 at 83 markets. Currently there are eleven federal orders. The population of the Federal milk marketing areas has increased 399 percentsince 1955 and 2.3 percent since consolidation of orders in 2000. The number of handlers peaked at 2,314 in 1961 and is currently approximately 338 handlers. This is a decline of 85 percent of the handlers.

The number of producers peaked in 1961 at 192,947. In 2002, there were 63,856 producers or 66.9 percent less producers than 1961. Receipt of producer milk in federal orders reached 125.5 billion pounds in 2002. This is a 738 percent gain since 1947 and a 7.4 percent gain since order consolidation in 2000. Daily deliveries of milk per producer have grow n from 302 pounds in 1947 to 5,387 pounds per producer in 2002.

ORDER 33 MARKET SUMMARY

The Producer Price Differential For the Mideast Marketing Area for March 2003 was \$125 and the Statistical Uniform Price was \$1036 for the month. The Statistical Uniform Price is down 36 cents from last month, and is \$1.57 bwer than March 2002.

The Producer Butterfat Price of \$1.1459 perpound increased 0.86 cents from February 2003 and is down 21.79 cents from a year ago. The Protein Price of \$1.6648 is down 189 cents from last month and is down 16.94 cents from M arch 2002. The Other Solids Price in March was \$0.0206 perpound, a decrease from last month's price of \$00240 and a decrease of 4.82 cents from last March. The Somatic C ell Adju stment rate for March was \$0.00054.

March producer receipts of 146 billion pounds were 5.0 percent higher than February 2003, and 7.6 percent lower than March 2002 production of 1.58 billion pounds. Producer milk allocated to Class I accounted for 37.4 percent of the total producer milk in March 2003, less than the 37.6 percent in February and more than the 349 percent in March 2002. A total of 10,470 producers were pooled on the Mideast Order with an average daily delivery of 4,488 pounds compared to 11,794 producers pooled in March 2002 with an average daily delivery of 4,310 pounds.

The market average content of producer milk w as as follows: Butterfat 3.74%; Protein 3.03 %; Other Solids 5.71 % and Nonfat Solids 8.74%.
