## USDA HOLDS HEARING ON PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE APPALACHIAN, FLORIDA, AND SOUTHEAST FEDERAL MILK MARKETING ORDERS

The U. S. Department of Agriculture held a public hearing on an emergency basis, to consider a proposal to amend the Appalachian, Florida, and Southeast Federal milk m arketing orders. The hearing began at 9 a.m. on Thursday, October 7,2004 at the Sheraton Gate way Atlanta Airport Hotel, Atlanta, Georgia.

The hearing considered a proposal that would implement a tem porary supplemental charge on Class I milk which would be disbursed through a marketwide service payment provision in the three Southeastern orders. The proposal would help dairy cooperatives and dairy manufacturers offset som e of the financial losses experienced as a result of recent humicanes. Evidence was taken at the hearing to determine whether marketing conditions exist that warrant on ission of a recommended decision for the proposal

## TIME EXTENDED SUBMISSION OF ADDITIONAL PROPOSALS CONCERNING HEARING REQUESTED TO AMEND ALL FEDERAL MILK ORDERS (Northeast, et al.)

The U.S. Department of Agriculture is extending the time period for interested parties to submit additional proposals for consideration with a public hearing request currently under review that would amend the fluidm ilk product definition in all Federa lmilk m arkeing orders. The public hearing request was submitted by Dairy Farmers of America (DFA). The deadline for submitting proposals (announced in our February 3, 2004 letter) is hereby extended from September 30, 2004, to January 31, 2005.

Proposals should be mailed to: Deputy Administrator, USDA/ AMS/Dairy Programs, STOP-0225-Room 2968, 1400 Independence Avenue, SW, Washington, DC 20250-0225, by January 31, 2005. Each proposal should be accompanied by a brief but comprehensive statement on the need for the proposal. The statement will be used in deciding whether the proposal should be considered if a hearing to amend the orders is held.

A hearing would be limited to proposals included in the hearing notice. How ever, appropriate modifications of the proposals included in the notice also m ay beconsidered at the hearing if the modifications would not enlarge the marketing area or regulate persons not now subject to the order. Any proposals that would extend regulation should be accompanied by the names and addresses of persons who proponents believe would be affected by the proposed extension and an estimate of the number of additional dairy farmers involved.

## **ORDER 33 MARKET SUMMARY**

The Producer Price Differential for the Mideast Marketing Area for September 2004 was \$034 and the Statistical Uniform Price was \$15.06 for the month. The Statistical Uniform Price is \$0.45 higher than last month, and is \$1.13 higher than September 2003.

The Producer Butterfat Price of \$1.9354 perpound increased 14.13 cents from A ugust 2004 and is up 71.36 cents from a year ago. The Protein Price of \$2.5431 is up 7.68 cents from last month and is down 7749 cents from September 2003. The Other Solids Price in September was \$0.0589 per pound, a decrease from last month's price of \$0.0676 and an increase of 4.19 cents from last September. The Somatic C ell Adjustment rate for September was \$000079.

September producer receipts of 1.34 billion pounds were 13.6 percent lower than August 2004, and 328 percent higher than September 2003 production of 101 billion pounds. Producer milk allocated to Class I accounted for 41.6 percent of the total producer milk in September 2004, more than the 34.5 percent in A ugust and less than the 548 percent in September 2003. A total of 10,224 producers were pooled on the Mideast Order compared to 10,601 producers pooled in September 2003.

The market average content of producer milk w as as follows: Butterfat 3.61%: Protein 3.03%: Other Solids 5.69% and Nonfat Solids 8.72%.

If USDA concludes that a hearing should be held, all known interested persons will be mailed a copy of the hearing notice. Anyone who desires to present evidence on proposals set forth in the hearing notice will have an opportunity to do so at the hearing.

Once a hearing notice is issued and until the issuance of a final decision, USDA employees involved in the decisional process may not discuss the merits of a proceeding on an ex parte basis with any persons having an interest in the proceeding. For this purpose, the Market Admin istrators and their staffs are considered to be involved in the decisional process. Thus, it is suggested that any discussions that you may wish to have with USDA personnel regarding hearing proposals be initiated soon. Procedural matters may be discussed at any time.

## **AUGUST MILK PRODUCTION UP 1.5 PERCENT**

Milk production in the 20 major States during August totaled 12.4 billion pounds, up 1.5 percent from August 2003. July revised production, at 12.5 billion pounds, was up 1.0 percent from July 2003. The July revision represented an increase of 36 million pounds or 0.3 percent from last month's preliminary production estimate.

Production per cow in the 20 major States averaged 1,595 pounds for August, 24 pounds above August 2003. The number of cows on farms in the 20 major States was 7.77 million head, 5,000 head less than August 2003, but 7,000 head more than July 2004.

The Mideast Marketing Area has four states represented in the 20 major states used above. They are Indiana, Michigan, Ohio, and Pennsylvania. Milk production in these Mideast states during August totaled 2.0 billion pounds, down 27 million pounds or 13 percent from A ugust 2003.

Production per cow in the Mideast states averaged 1,570 pounds for August, eight pounds Below A ugust 2003. The number of cows on farms in the Mideast states was 1.3 m illion head, 9,000 head less than August 2003.

### USDA ANNOUNCES FINAL DECISION TO AMEND ALL FEDERAL MILK MARKETING ORDERS

The U. S. Department of Agriculture announced a final decision that permanently adopts amendments to the classification of milk provisions in all 10 Federal milk m arketing orders. These provisions were previously implemented on an interim basis. This decision is based on testimony and evidence from a public hearing held O ctober 21, 2003, in A lexandria, Virginia.

This decision adopts changes that reclassifym ilk used to produce evaporated milk or sweetened condensed milk in consumer-type packages from Class III to Class IV. A proposal to classify m onthly bulk milk ending inventories to the low est-priced class of C lass III or Class IV is not adopted in this fin ald ecision.

The final decision was published in the September 24 Federal Register. USDA will conduct a vote within 30 days to determine whether dairy farmers approve the proposed amended orders. If approved, a final rule will follow to implement these changes.

### AUGUST FLUID MILK SALES

During August, about 4.5 billion pounds of packaged fluid milk products is estimated to have been sold in the United States. This was 1.2 percent low er than August 2003. After adjusting for calendar composition, sales in August 2004 were 1.2 percent low er than August 2003. On an individual product basis, after adjusting for calendar composition, sales of fat-free (skim) milk and flavored fatreduced milk increased from August 2003, while sales of whole milk, flavored w hole milk, reduced fat (2%) milk, low fat (1%) milk, and buttermilk decreased from a year earlier.
