USDA ANNOUNCES FINAL DECISION TO AMEND THE PACIFIC NORTHWEST MILK MARKETING ORDER

The U.S. Department of Agriculture announced a final decision that permanently adopts pooling provisions of the Pacific N orthw est milk m arketing order. These provisions were previously adopted on an interim basis.

This final decision permanently adopts an amendment to the producer milk provision that would eliminate the ability to simultaneously pool milk on the Pacific N orthw estm **k** order when the same milk is already pooled on a State-operated milk order that has market-wide pooling.

The final decision was published in the December 30, 2004 Federal Register. USDA will conduct a vote on the amended order to determine producer approval.

USDA ANNOUNCES TENTATIVE DECISION TO AMEND THE ARIZONA-LAS VEGAS MILK MARKETING ORDER

The U.S. Department of Agriculture announced a tentative final decision that amends the current pooling provisions of the Arizona-Las Vegas milk m arketing order. This decision is based on testimony and evidence given at a public hearing.

This decision adopts, on an interim and emergency basis, an amendment to the producer milk provision that would eliminate the ability to simultaneously pool milk on the Arizona-L as Vegas milk order when the same milk is already pooled on a state-operated milk order that has market-wide pooling. Interested persons have 60 days to file comments in response to the tenta tive decision.

This decision appeared in the December 30, 2004 Federal Register and requires producer approval. If producers approve the order as amended, USDA will issue an amended order on an interim basis.

NOVEMBER MILK PRODUCTION UP 1.2 PERCENT

Milk production in the 20 major States during November totaled 11.8 billion pounds, up 1.2 percent from November 2003. October revised production, at 123 billion pounds, was up 1.4 percent from October 2003. The October revision represented an increase of 0.1 percent or 9 million pounds from last month's preliminary production estimate.

Production per cow in the 20 major States averaged 1,526 pounds for November, 9 pounds above November 2003.

The number of cows on farms in the 20 major States was 7.77 million head, 44,000 head more than November 2003, but unchanged from October 2004.

The Mideast Marketing Area has four states represented in the 20

major states used above. They are Indiana, Michigan, Ohio, and Pennsylvania. Milk production in these Mideast states during November totaled 1.9 billion pounds, up 18 million pounds or 0.9 percent from November 2003.

Production per cow in the Mideast states averaged 1,505 pounds for November, 16 pounds below N ovem ber 2003.

The number of cows on farms in the Mideast states was 1.3m illion head, 20,000 head more than November 2003.

2004 MARKET SUMMARY

Producer milk receipts totaled 159 billion pounds on the Mideast Order during 2004, an increase of 189.6 million pounds, or 12 percent from 2003. Large volum esofm ik w ere de-pooled in March, April, May, and December due to unfavorable pricing conditions. Monthly producer receipts ranged from alow of 873 million pounds in A pril to a high of 1.55 billion pounds in June.

The number of producers pooled on the Mideast Order in 2004 averaged 9,940 per month, down 3.2 percent from a year earlier. Producer milk averaged 3.67 percent butterfat ranging from a high of 3.79 percent in January to a low of 3.55 percent in July. The protein test averaged 3.04 percent for the year. It ranged from a low of 2.94 percent in July, to a high of 3.11 percent in November. Other solids averaged 5.70 percent for the year.

For the year, 40.7 percent of producer milk w as utilized as C lass I; 17.3 percent in Class II; 36.7 percent in Class III; and 5.3 percent in Class IV. The Class I utilization percentage had a high of 62.3 percent in A pril and a low of 35.0 percent in June. Class I milk totaled 6.5 billion pounds during 2004, down 0.8 percent from 2003. Class II

ORDER 33 MARKET SUMMARY

The Producer Price Differential for the Mideast Marketing Area for December 2004 was -\$0.62 and the Statistical Uniform Price was \$15.52 for the month. The Statistical Uniform Price is \$0.31 higher than last month, and is \$2.26 higher than December 2003.

The Producer Butterfat Price of \$2.0366 perpound decreased 1.23 cents from November 2004 and is up 66.78 cents from a year ago. The Protein Price of \$28486 is up 41.89 cents from last month and is up 54.89 cents from December 2003. The Other Solids Price in December was \$0.0858 per pound, an increase from last month's price of \$00800 and an increase of 4.96 cents from last December. The Somatic C ell Adjustment rate for December was \$0.00086.

December producer receipts of 984.4 million pounds were 33.3 percent lower than November 2004, and 32.4 percent lower than December 2003 production of 1.46 billion pounds. Producer milk allocated to Class I accounted for 58.3 percent of the total producer milk in December 2004, more than the 38.1 percent in N ovember and more than the 38.6 percent in December 2003. A total of 9,785 producers were pooled on the Mideast Order compared to 10,367 producers pooled in December 2003.

The market average content of producer milk w as as follows: Butterfat 3.76%; Protein 3.10%; Other Solids 5.68% and Nonfat Solids 8.78%.

milk totaled 2.8 billion pounds, an increase of 6.8 percent from 2003. Class III pooled pounds were 5.8 billion pounds, an increase of 1.6 % from 2003. Class IV milk totaled 851.5 million pounds, a decrease of 2.8 percent from 2003.


The Class I price averaged \$16.98 for the year, an increase of \$3.59 from 2003. The Class I price had a low of \$13.59 in February and a high of \$23.13 in June. The Class II price averaged \$13.86, an increase of \$3.10. It was low est in January at \$11.67 and was highest in A pril at \$15.21. The Class III price averaged \$15.39, an increase of \$3.97. January was the bwest price at \$11.61 and May was the highest at \$2058. The Class IV price averaged \$13.20 for the year, an increase of \$3.20 from a yearago. It was the lowest in January at \$10.97 and was highest in A pril at \$14.57.

The Statistical Uniform Price averaged \$15.44 for 2004 compared to \$11.96 in 2003. The Producer Butterfat Price averaged \$2.0507 per pound in the year 2004. This was an increase of 84.08 cents from 2003. The price was low estin January at \$14978 perpound and was

highest in A pril at \$2.5013 per pound. The Protein Price averaged \$2.6035 per pound. This was an increase of 22.65 cents from the previous year. The low estprice was \$1.7911 per pound in Febru ary and the highest price was in May at \$3.7639 perpound. Other Solids Price averaged \$ 0.0751 pound. This was an increase of 6.22 cents from 2003. It was low estin February at\$0090 perpound and highest in May with a rate of \$.1444 per pound. The Producer Price Differential (PPD) averaged \$0.05 cwt. in the year2004 producing a low in A pril of -\$3.78 and a high of 1.70 in July.

FORWARD PRICING PROGRAM ENDS

The legislation authorizing the Dairy Forward Pilot Program, commonly referred to as "forward contracting", expired on December 31, 2004. Efforts to enact legislation to m ake permanent the Dairy Forward Pricing Pilot Program have not been successful. Therefore, handlers with milk under forward contracts beyond December 31, 2004, will not be exempt from paying minimum Federal order prices to producers or cooperatives for pool milk received after that date.
