United States Sales of Fluid Milk Products for January-April were down 1.7 percent or 318 million pounds from 2004. The Mideast Marketing Area had sales of 2.153 billion pounds of packaged fluid milk during this same period. This was a drop of 34 million pounds or 1.6 percent from last year.

U.S. production of total Cheeses (excluding Cottage Cheese) included 30.2 billion pounds of milk used for the first four months of 2005. This was an increase of 0.9 percent or 282 million pounds from 2004. Milk used in cheese for the Mideast was nearly 2.9 billion pounds for January-April. This was an increase of 7.0 percent from 2004 totals of 29.9 billion pounds.

Milk used in U.S. Sour Cream and Yogurt production equaled 11.1 billion pounds for January-April 2005. This was an increase of 659.9 million pounds or 63 percentfrom 2004. Milk used for Sour Cream and Yogurt in the Mideast Area was 450 million pounds during this period. This was an increase of 34 million pounds or 82 percent.


Milk used in U.S. Butter production totaled 102 billion pounds for January—April 2005. This was an increase of 929.9m illion pounds from 2004. Butter production in the Mideast Marketing Area utilized 73 million pounds of milk during this period. This was an increase of 17 million pounds from 2004.

USDA ANNOUNCES FINAL DECISION TO AMEND THE ARIZONA - LAS VEGAS MILK MARKETING ORDER

The U. S. Department of Agriculture announced a partial final decision that permanently adopts an amendment to the pooling provisions of the Arizona-Las Vegas milk marketing order that previously were implemented on an interim basis. This decision is based on testimony and evidence given at a public hearing held at Tem pe, Arizona, on September 23-25, 2003; reconvened at Seattle, Washington, on November 17-21, 2003; and reconvened at Alexandria, Virginia, on January 20-22, 2004.

This partial final decision permanently adopts an amendment to the Producer milk provision that would eliminate the ability to simultaneously pool milk on the Arizona-Las Vegas milk order when the same milk is already pooled on a State-operated milk order that has marketwide pooling.

The partial final decision was published in the June 27 Federal Register. USDA will conduct a vote on the amended order to determine producer approval. If producers approve the order as amended by this final decision, a final rule will follow to implement these changes on a permanent basis.



MAY MILK PRODUCTION UP 4.4 PERCENT

Milk production in the 23 major States during May totaled 14.2 billion pounds, up 4.4 percent from May 2004. April revised production, at 13.6 billion pounds, was up 3.4 percent from April 2004. The April revision represented an increase of 0.3 percent or 35 million pounds from last month's pre liminary production estimate.

Production per cow in the 23 major States averaged 1,754 pounds for May, 62 pounds above May 2004.

The number of milk cows on farms in the 23 major States was 8.12 million head, 54,000 head more than May 2004, and 9,000 head more than April 2005.

The Mideast Marketing Area has four states represented in the 23 major states used above. They are Indiana, Michigan, Ohio, and Pennsylvania. Milk production in these Mideast states during May totaled 2.2 billion pounds, up 131 million pounds or 6.2 percent from April 2004.

Production percowin the Mideast states averaged 1,736 pounds for May, 51 pounds above May 2004.

The number of cows on farms in the Mideast states was 1.3 million head, 30,000 head more than May 2004.

ORDER 33 MARKET SUMMARY

The Producer Price Differential for the Mideast Marketing Area for June 2005 was \$0.44 and the Statistical Uniform Price was \$14.36 for the month. The Statistical Uniform Price is \$0.04 lower than last month, and is \$4.20 lower than June 2004.


The Producer Butterfat Price of \$1.5932 per pound increased 4.57 cents from M ay 2005 and is down 58.36 cents from a year ago. The Protein Price of \$2.5741 is down 224 cents from last month and is down 53.45 cents from June 2004. The Other Solids Price in June was \$0.1139 per pound, an increase from last month's price of \$0.1043 and a decrease of 2.00 cents from last June. The Somatic Cell Adjustment rate for June was \$0.00074.

June producer receipts of 163 billion pounds were 66 percent lower than May 2005, and 4.9 percent higher than June 2004 production of 155 billion pounds. Producer milk allocated to Class I accounted for 29.7 percent of the total producer milk in June 2005, less than the 30.2 percent in May 2005 and less than the 30.5 percent in June 2004. A total of 9,714 producers were pooled on the Mideast Order compared to 10391 producers pooled in June 2004.

The market average content of producer milk w as as follows: Butterfat 3.52%; Protein 292%; Other Solids 5.74% and Nonfat Solids 8.66%.

MAY 2005 MIDEAST POOLED PRODUCER POUNDS

The Mideast Marketing Area had a record 1.75 billion pounds of milk pooled in May 2005. This was an increase of 608 million pounds, or 53.5 percent, from May 2000 (the first year of the consolidated Mideast Order). The states with the largest increase in milk pooled on the Mideast Orderduring this time period were Wisconsin, Michigan, New York. Milk pooled has increased from Wisconsin by 336.1m illion pounds, Michigan by 100.5m illion pounds, New York by 87.3m illion pounds. Milk receipts from Pennsylvania declined 21.5m illion pounds, or 14.5 percent, during the time period.
