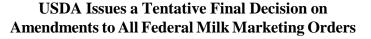

The U. S. Department of Agriculture issued a tentative final decision to amend the manufacturing (make) allow ancescontained in the Class III and Class IV product price formulas in all Federal milk m arketing orders. The decision was based on the record of the first session of an emergency public hearing held in Alexandria, Virgin ia, on January 24-27, 2006, and a second session held in Strongsville, Ohio, on Septem ber 14-15, 2006.

The decision amends the manufacturing (make) allow ances for cheese, butter, nonfat drymilk (NFDM) and drywhey. Specifically, this decision adopts the following increased manufacturing allow ances cheese \$0.1682 perpound; butter\$0.1202 perpound; NFDM \$0.1570 per pound; and drywhey \$0.1956 perpound. These amendments are subject to producer approval before they can be implemented.

The tentative final decision was published in the November 22<sup>nd</sup> *Federal Register*. Public comments are due 60 days after publication in the *Federal Register*, on January 22, 2007.

## USDA Sets Hearing on Proposed Amendments to All Federal Milk Orders

The U. S. Department of Agriculture commenced a national public hearing on December 11<sup>th</sup> to consider proposals seeking to amend the Class I and Class II milk price formulas applicable to all Federal milk marketing orders. Evidence was taken at the hearing to determine whether emergency marketing conditions existed that would warrant omission of a recommended decision.

The hearing was requested by National Milk Producers Federation to reconsider formulas for Class I and Class II milk.

#### October Milk Production Up 2.1 Percent

Milk production in the 23 major States during October totaled 13.7 billion pounds, up 2.1 percent from October 2005. September revised production, at 13.3 billion pounds, was up 2.0 percent from Septem ber 2005. The September revision represented a decrease of 6 million pounds from last month's pre liminary production estimate.

Production per cow in the 23 major States averaged 1,656 pounds for October, 19 pounds above October 2005. The number of milk

cows on farms in the 23 major States was 8.25 million head, 78,000 head more than October 2005, and 2,000 head more than September 2006.

The Mideast Marketing Area has four states represented in the 23 major states used above. They are Indiana, Michigan, Ohio, and Pennsylvania. Milk production in these Mideast states during October totaled 2.2 billion pounds, up 79 million pounds or 3.8 percent from October 2005.

Production percowin the Mideast states averaged 1,640 pounds for October, 26 pounds above October 2005. The number of cows on farms in the Mideast states was 1.3 million head, 16,000 head more than October 2005.

#### USDA Holds Federal Milk Order Pre-Hearing Information Session

The U.S. Department of Agriculture held a public information session December 5,2006, to address proposals received to amend the federal order Class III and Class IV product price formulas.

The purpose of the session was for interested parties to learn about the intent of proposals that have been submitted to amend Class III and Class IV product price formulas. The session enabled proponents to better prepare testimony and evidence in support of, or in opposition to proposals that may possibly be included in a future Class III and IV hearing notice. The session will not become part of an official hearing record and was conducted outside of ex-parte rules. This allowed government officials to freely discuss proposed amendments.

#### **ORDER 33 MARKET SUMMARY**

The Producer Price Differential for the Mideast Marketing Area for November 2006 was \$029 and the Statistical Uniform Price was \$13.13 for the month. The Statistical Uniform Price is the \$0.22 higher than last month, and is \$1.22 lower than November 2005.

The Producer Butterfat Price of \$1.3852 per pound decreased 2.97 cents from O dober 2006 and is down 22.62 cents from a year ago. The Protein Price of \$2.2383 is up 16.08 cents from last month and is down 341 cents from November 2005. The Other Solids Price in November was \$0.2276 per pound, an increase from last month's price of \$0.2026 and an increase of 6.70 cents from last November. The Somatic Cell Adjustment rate for November was \$0.00066.

November producer receipts of 131 billion pounds were 3.1 percent lower than October 2006, and 69 percent lower than November 2005 production of 140 billion pounds. Producer milk allocated to Class I accounted for 43.8 percent of the total producer milk in November 2006, more than the 42.4 percent in October 2006 and more than the 400 percent in November 2005. A total of 7,984 producers were pooled on the Mideast Order compared to 8,893 producers pooled in November 2005.

The market average content of producer milk was as follows: Butterfat 3.79%; Protein 3.12%; Other Solids 5.68% and Nonfat Solids 8.80%.

#### The Dairy Outlook

Current USDA estimates place 2006 milk production at 181.9 billion pounds, a 2.8-percent increase above 2005. This is below the 3.5 percent increase a year earlier, but still above the five year average of 1-to-2 percent growth. Forecast milk production in 2007 is 183 billion pounds, less than a 1-percentincrease over 2006. Cow numbers will likely decline slightly in 2007 compared with 2006; however, production percow will continue to increase, albeit at a low er rate than in 2006. Rising feed prices, especially forcom due to increasing ethanol production, are squeezing milk-feed price ratios and are likely to continue to do so well into 2007.

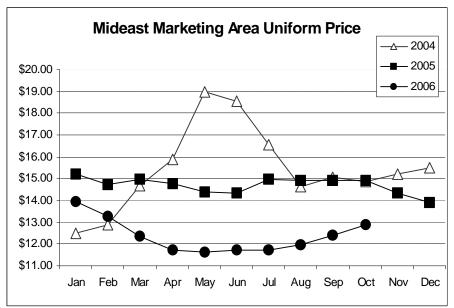
The cheese market is roughly in balance but in ventories of "other cheeses" are above those of last year. Demand for cheese remains strong, especially formozzare lla. Some reallocation of production to dry products could occur in the balance of 2006. Although cheese demand is strong, supplies are such that any further large rise in prices in the balance of 2006 and the first half of 2007 is unlikely. The season average price for cheese is projected at \$1230 to \$1.240 apound for 2006. In 2007, the price is forecast at \$1.305 to \$1.395 apound. Smaller in creases in milk production in 2007, coupled with strong demand for all dairy products, are the basis for a higher 2007 cheese price.

Whey supplies could tighten further as milk is directed tow and N on fat D ry Milk (NDM) and SkimMilk Powder (SM P) production. Whey prices are projected to average 32.0 to 33.0 cents a pound in the current year and 30.0 to 33.0 cents a pound in 2007. The market for NDM, SM P, and whey remains very tight. There are reports of orders being delayed or shorted. Cum ula tive exports of SMP were trailing year-earlier levels through May; however, the gap had nearly disappeared by September. Tight domestic supplies have also contributed to high prices. Exports of NDM and SM P could range higher in 2007 because of strong international demand induced by a relatively weaker U.S. dollar and lower availabilities from A ustrala and the European Union. Higher prices are also aided by lower global total stocks of dairy products. A reallocation of milk to Class IV uses would boost Class III prices, keeping cheese and whey prices firm.

An increase in Class IV use to augment NDM/SMP supplies could soften butter prices in the balance of 2006 and into 2007. However, demand for butter remains seasonally strong and lower prices are encouraging additional retail a c tivity. Butter stocks are ample to meet additional demand. The butter price is expected to average \$1.205 to \$1.235 a pound in 2006 and \$1.250 to \$1.370 a pound in 2007.

The expected modest increase in milk production in 2007 in the face of strong product demand should boost milk prices in 2007. The Class IV price is expected to average \$10.95 to \$11.15 in 2006 and rise to \$11.20 to \$12.20 in 2007. The Class III price is projected at \$11.70 to \$11.80 in 2006, climbing to \$12.40 to \$13.30 in 2007. The expected average all milk price is estimated to be \$12.80 to \$12.90 in 2006 and \$13.40 to \$14.30 in 2007.
