HEARING ON PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO ALL FEDERAL MILK ORDERS

The U. S. Department of Agriculture will hold a national public hearing to consider a proposalseek ing to amend the Class III and Class IV milk price formula manufacturing allow ances for all Federalmilk m arkeing orders. USDA will take evidence at the hearing to determine whether emergency marketing conditions exist that would w anantomission of a recommended decision. The hearing will begin at 8:30 a.m. on January 24, 2006, at the Sheraton Suites Old TownA lexandria, 801 North Sain t Asaph Street, Alex and ria, Virginia, 22314.

The hearing was requested by Agri-Mark Dairy Cooperative to reconsider the manufacturing cost allow ances provided for in the pricing formulas forcheese, whey powder, butter, and nonfat drym ilk powder. The proponent stated that the current fix ed allo wances were calculated using 1998-2000 California and Department of Agriculture C oopera tive Service surveys. While the product price formulas have been amended since 2000, the proponent claims that manufacturing costs have continued to increase, leaving them unable to recoup these additional costs from the marketplace.

The hearing notice was published as a proposed rule in the January 5 *Federal Register*. USDA ANNOUNCES FINAL RULE TO PERMANENTLY AMEND UPPER MIDWEST MILK ORDER

The U.S. Department of Agriculture announced a final rule that permanently adopts a mendments to the pooling and transportation credit provisions of the Upper Midw estm ik m arketing order that were previously implemented on an interim basis. This decision is based on testimony and evidence given at a public hearing held at Bloomington, Minnesota, on August 16-19, 2004.

The adopted amendments allow only supply plants located in the states that comprise the Upper Midw estm arketing area to use milk delivered directly from producers' farms for qualification purposes, eliminate the ability to pool as producer milk diversions to nonpool plants outside of the states that comprise the marketing area, and limit the transportation credit received by handlers to the first 400 miles of applicable milkm ovem ents.

A polling of cooperatives conducted in response to the partial final decision issued on September 29, 2005, indicates producer approval of the Upper Midw estorder, as amended. The final rule w aspublished in the December 9 *Federal Register*.

NOVEMBER MILK PRODUCTION UP 4.6 PERCENT

Milk production in the 23 major States during November totaled 13.0 billion pounds, up 4.6 percent from November 2004. October revised production, at 13.3 billion pounds, was up 4.0 percent from October 2004. The October revision represented a decrease of 17 million pounds from last month's pre liminary production estimate.

Production per cow in the 23 major States averaged 1,590 pounds for November, 59 pounds above November 2004. The number of milk cows on farms in the 23 major States was 8.16 million head, 60,000 head more than November 2004, and 2000 head more than October 2005.

The Mideast Marketing Area has four states represented in the 23 major states used above. They are Indiana, Michigan, Ohio, and Pennsylvania. Milk production in these Mideast states during October totaled 2.0 billion pounds, up 98 million pounds or 5.1 percent from November 2004.

Production per cow in the Mideast states averaged 1,571 pounds for November, 69 pounds above November 2004. The number of cows on farms in the Mideast states was 1.3m illion head, 6,000 head more than November 2004.

ORDER 33 MARKET SUMMARY

The Producer Price Differential for the Mideast Marketing Area for December 2005 was \$053 and the Statistical Uniform Price was \$13.90 for the month. The Statistical Uniform Price is \$0.45 lower than last month, and is \$1.62 lower than December 2004.

The Producer Butterfat Price of \$15036 perpound decreased 10.78 cents from N ovem ber 2005 and is down 53.30 cents from a year ago. The Protein Price of \$ 2.3846 is up 11.22 cents from last month and is down 46.40 cents from D ecem ber2004. The Other Solids Price in N ovember was \$0.1702 per pound, an increase from last month's price of \$0.1606 and an increase of 8.44 cents from last December. The Somatic C ell Adjustment rate for December was \$000070.

December producer receipts of 144 billion pounds were 2.8 percent higher than N ovember 2005, and 46.7 percent higher than December 2004 production of 984 million pounds. Producer milk allocated to Class I accounted for 39.5 percent of the total producer milk in December 2005, less than the 40.0 percent in November 2005 and less than the 58.3 percent in D ecember 2004. A total of 8843 producers were pooled on the Mideast Order compared to 9,785 producers pooled in December 2004.

COMPUTATION OF UNIFORM PRICE

The market average content of producer milk w as as follows: Butterfat 3.84%; Protein 3.14%; Other Solids 5.69% and Nonfat Solids 8.83%.

SPOTLIGHT ON THE MIDEAST: MICHIGAN

Mideast producer milk pooled in September2005 included 487.5m illion pounds from 2,213 producers in Michigan. This compares to 458.3 million pounds of milk from 2,318 producers in Septem ber2004. Michigan producers also pooled 30.9m illion pounds of milk on the Appalach ian Order (F.O. 5), 12.7m illion pounds on the Southeast Order (F.O. 7), and 4.8m illion pounds on the Upper Midw estO rder (F.O. 30). Michigan producers also had 12.0 million pounds of milk that was either unregulated milk (not pooled) or pooled on the Northeast or Central Orders.



production equal to 33.8 percent of the total pounds of milk pooled from M ichigan in S eptember 2005. These same five counties topped milk production in September 2004 with 31.7 percent of all milk pooled from M ichigan.

The Mideast Orderhad twelvepool distributing plants and two supply plants located in Michigan in September. These plants pooled 306.3 million pounds of milk with Class Iutilization of 59.3% for the month. This compares to 282.1m illion pounds of milk and a Class Iutilization of 61.4% in September 2004.

Twenty-Five Michigan manufacturing plants received eitherdiverted or transferred pooled milk product in Septem berof 2005.
