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# USDA Issues Notice of Intent to Reconvene National Public Hearing to Amend Class III and IV Milk Price Formulas

The U. S. Department of Agriculture announced its intent to reconvene a national public hearing to amend the Class III and Class IV price formulas. USDA will reconvene the national hearing, originally held January 24-27, 2006, in A lexandria, Virginia, to assure that any changes to m anufacturing allowance factors used in Federal order Class III and Class IV product price formulas are appropriate and reflective of manufacturing costs. USDA also w elcomes additional proposals addressing the Federal order Class III and Class IV price formulas for further consideration in the reconvened hearing. The additional proposals are due on orbefore S eptember 30, 2006

The notice of intent to reconvene the hearing was published as a proposed rule in the June 28 Federal Register. # May Milk Production Up 3.7 Percent

Milk production in the 23 major States during May totaled 14.7 billion pounds, up 2.8 percent from May 2005. April revised production, at 14.2 billion pounds, was up 3.7 percent from A pril 2005. The April revision represented a decrease of 2 million pounds from last months pre limin ary production estimate.

Production per cow in the 23 major States averaged 1,782 pounds for May, 22 pounds above May 2005.

The number of milk cows on farms in the 23 major States was 8.26 million head, 128,000 head more than May 2005, and 19,000 head more than April 2006.

The Mideast Marketing Area has four states represented in the 23 major states used above. They are Indiana, Michigan, Ohio, and Pennsylvania. Milk production in these Mideast states during May totaled 2.3 billion pounds, up 25 million pounds or 1.1 percent from May 2005.

Production per cow in the Mideast states averaged 1,740 pounds for May, 6 pounds below May 2005.

The number of cows on farms in the Mideast states was 1.3m illion head, 10,000 head more than May 2005.

# **Container Survey Completed For November 2005**

A survey of the type of container and method of distribution of fluid milk products is conducted biennially for the month of N ovember. Sales information is collected from all Mideast pool handlers operating plants that sell fluid packaged milk products on routes. The survey included total route disposition, product type, container size, container type, and method of distribution.

The Mideast Marketing Area route dispositions by poolplants for November 2005 totaled 548.7 m illion pounds of milk. This was an increase of 10.6 m illion pounds from Novem ber2003 buta decrease of 1.3 m illion pounds from Novem ber2001. Packaged milk sales surveyed include whole, reduced fat (2%), low fat (1%), fat free (skim), flavored whole, flavored fat reduced (low fat and skim), buttermilk, and eggnog. Data was collected for three containerty pes (glass, paper, and plastic) and forseven container sizes (g allon, h alf-g allon, q u art, p in t, h alf-p in t, 6-g allon, and 5-g allon).

## **Product Type**

Reduced fat (2%) sales accounted for 41.1 percent of the total route sales in N ovember 2005. Whole milk accounted for 22.8 percent, fat free 14.5 percent, and low fat 9.4 percent of total route sales. Flavored fat reduced milk accounted for a combined 8.8 percent, flavored w hole milk 1.6 percent, buttermilk 0.9 percent, and eggnog 0.9 percent of total sales for the month.

## **Container Type**

Plastic containers accounted for 87.9 percent of all route sales in November2005. Papercontainers accounted for 12.08 percent, while glass containers represented 0.02 percent of route sales. S ales in single serve plastic containers totaled nearly 12.7 million pounds of (Continued on Page 3)

## **ORDER 33 MARKET SUMMARY**

The Producer Price Differential for the Mideast Marketing Area for June 2006 was \$0.45 and the Statistical Uniform Price was \$11.74 for the month. The Statistical Uniform Price is \$0.09 higher than last month, and is \$2.62 bwer than June 2005.

The Producer Butterfat Price of \$12436 perpound decreased 146 cents from May 2006 and is down 34.96 cents from a year ago. The Protein Price of \$2.0790 is up 16.75 cents from last month and is down 49.51 cents from June 2005. The Other Solids Price in June was \$0.1255 perpound, an increase from last month's price of \$0.1251 and an increase of 1.16 cents from last June. The Somatic Cell Adjustment rate for June was \$0.00061.

June producer receipts of 150 billion pounds were 49 percent lower than May 2006, and 7.9 percent low er than June 2005 production of 1.63 billion pounds. Producer milk allocated to Class I accounted for 33.7 percent of the total producer milk in June 2006, less than the 35.4 percent in May 2006 and more than the 29.7 percent in June 2005. A total of 8,612 producers were pooled on the Mideast Order compared to 9,714 producers pooled in June 2005.

The market average content of producer milk w as as follows: Butterfat 3 59%; Protein 296%; Other Solids 5.71% and Nonfat Solids 8.67%.

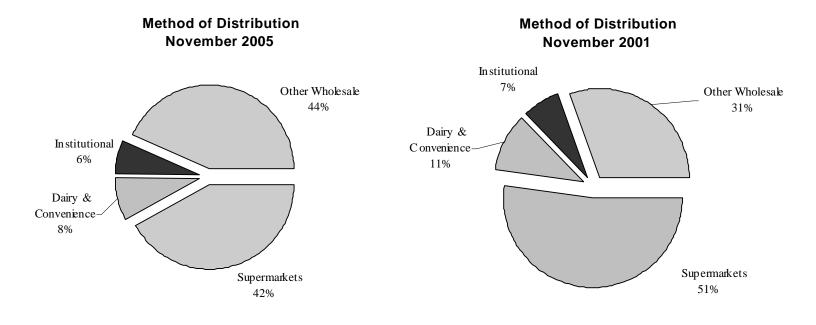

#### **Container Size**

The majority of fluidm ilk sales continued to be in gallon containers, which accounted for 68.2 percent of total sales. Gallon container usage was down slightly from the survey in N ovember 2003 when gallons accounted for 70.1 percent of total sales. Half-gallon containers represented 16.1 percent of sales, an increase from 15.5 percent in 2003 and 14.9 percent in 2001, quarts 2.7 percent, and pints 1.6 percent of total route sales. Half-pints accounted for 10.0 percent of route sales, which was an increase from 8.8 percent in 2003 and 9.2 percent in 2001. Sales for 5-gallon containers accounted for 0.9 percent of route sales.

#### **Method of Distribution**

Wholesale deliveries accounting for nearly all route sales in the 2005 survey as home deliveries volum es w ere m nim alO fthe w holesale distribution total, 42.0 percent were to supermarkets; 8.2 percent to dairy and convenience stores; 6.4 percent to institutions such as schools and military; and 43.4 percent to other wholesales establishments such as superstores/hypermarkets, warehouse stores, and other wholesale outlets. The distribution to supermarkets has decreased 9.8 percent from the N ovember 2001 survey results. Dairy and C onvenience has decreased 2.4 percent and institutional outlets have decreased 0.2 percent while other wholesale establishments have seen an increase of 12.8 percent since November 2001 (See Pie C hart).
