Mideast Market Administrator's

Federal Order No. 33

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March 2006



The U. S. Department of Agriculture announced a recommended decision to adopt amendments to the pooling provisions of the Mideast milk m arketing order. This decision is based on testimony and evidence given at a public hearing held in Wooster, Ohio, from March 7-10, 2005.

The amendments recommended for adoption would: 1) Esta blish a limit on the volum e ofm ik a handlermay pool during the months of April through Febru ary to 115 percent of the volum eofm ilk pooled in the prior month; and 2) E stab lish a limit on the volum eofm ik a handler may pool during the month of March to 120 percent of the volum eof milk pooled in the prior month. The provisions to limit pooling are intended to deter the disorderly conditions that arise when de-pooling occurs.

Proposals seeking to establish a transportation credit provision for the Mideast Order were not recommended for adoption.

USDA ANNOUNCES RECOMMENDED DECISION TO AMEND UPPER MIDWEST MILK ORDER

The U.S. Department of Agriculture announced a recommended decision to adopt amendments to the pooling provisions of the Upper Midw estm ilk m arketing order. This decision is based on testimony and evidence given at a public hearing held in Blooming ton, Minnesota, on August 16-19, 2004.

The amendments recommended for adoption would: 1) establish a limit on the volum e ofm ik a handlermay pool during the months of April through Febru ary to 125 percent of the volum eofin ilk pooled in the prior month; 2) establish a limit on the volum e ofm ik a handlermay pool during the month of March to 135 percent of the volum e ofm ik pooled in the prior month; and 3) allow the market administrator to increase the maximum administrative assessment rate up to 8 cents per hundred weight on all pooled milk if necessary tom aintain the required fund reserves.

The recommended decision appeared in the February 22nd Federal Register. Public comments are due April 24, 2006.

USDA ANNOUNCES RECOMMENDED DECISION TO AMEND CENTRAL MILK ORDER

The U. S. Department of Agriculture announced a recommended decision to adopt a mendments to the pooling provisions of the Central Milk Marketing Order. This decision is based on testimony and

evidence given at a public hearing held at Kansas City, Missouri, on December 6-8, 2004.

The amendments recommended foradoption would increase supply plant performance standards, amend features of the "touch-base" provision, amend certain features of the "split plant" provision and decrease the diversion limit standards of the order. The decision also recommends adoption of a proposal that would limit the volum eofm k a handler can pool in a month to 125 percent of the total volum eofm k pooled in the previous month.

The recommended decision was published in the February 22nd *Federal Register*. Public comments are due by April 24, 2006.

JANUARY MILK PRODUCTION UP 5.4 PERCENT

Milk production in the 23 major States during January totaled 14.0 billion pounds, up 5.4 percent from January 2005. December revised production, at 13.6 billion pounds, was up 4.1 percent from December 2004.

Production per cow in the 23 major States averaged 1,711 pounds for January, 68 pounds above January 2005. The number of milk cows on farms in the 23 major States was 8.19 million head, 103,000 head more than January 2005, and 11,000 head more than December 2005.

The Mideast Marketing Area has four states represented in the 23 major states used above. They are Indiana, Michigan, Ohio, and Pennsylvania. Milk production in these Mideast states during January totaled 2.2 billion pounds, up 123 million pounds or 60 percent from January 2005.

Production per cow in the Mideast states averaged 1,676 pounds for January, 70 pounds above January 2005. The number of cows on farms in the Mideast states was 1.3 million head, 12,000 head more than January 2005.

ORDER 33 MARKET SUMMARY

The Producer Price Differential for the Mideast Marketing Area for February 2006 was \$108 and the Statistical Uniform Price was \$13.28 for the month. The Statistical Uniform Price is \$0.67 lower than last month, and is \$1.43 lower than February 2005.

The Producer Butterfat Price of \$13469 per pound decreased 12.15 cents from January 2006 and is down 42.85 cents from a yearago. The Protein Price of \$2.1220 is down 27.74 cents from last month and is down 5393 cents from February 2005. The Other Solids Price in February was \$0.1999 per pound, an increase from last month's price of \$0.1881 and an increase of 10.84 cents from last February. The Somatic Cell Adjustment rate for February was \$0.00063.

February producer receipts of 139 billion pounds were 8.1 percent lower than January 2006, and 16.8 percent higher than February 2005 production of 1.19 million pounds. Producer milk allocated to Class I accounted for 37.7 percent of the total producer milk in February 2006, less than the 37.9 percent in January 2006 and less than the 43.0 percent in February 2005. A total of 8,633 producers were pooled on the Mideast Order compared to 9,792 producers pooled in February 2005.

The market average content of producer milk was as follows: Butterfat 3.75%; Protein 3.06%; Other Solids 5.73% and Nonfat Solids 8.79%.

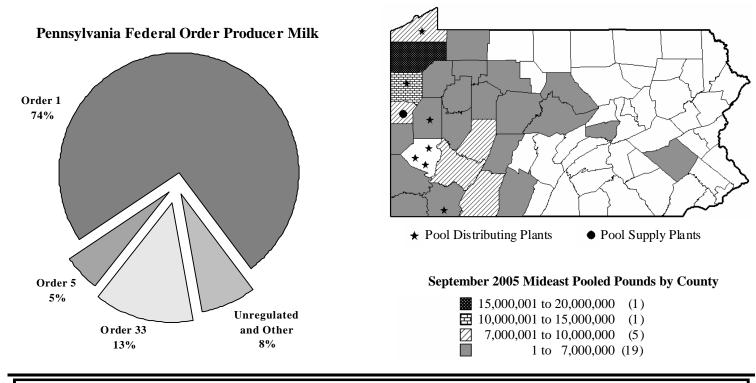
SPOTLIGHT ON THE MIDEAST: PENNSYLVANIA

 $\label{lem:milk} \begin{tabular}{ll} Mideast producer milk pooled in September 2005 included 113.2 million pounds from 1,297 producers in Pennsylvania. This compares to 104.2 million pounds of milk from 1,323 producers in September 2004. Pennsylvania producers also pooled 624.4 million pounds of milk on the Northeast Order (F.O. 1), 40.1 million pounds on the Appalachian Order (F.O. 5), and 64.3 million pounds were either unregulated milk (not pooled) or pooled on other Federal Orders.$

The top five counties of Pennsylvania for milk production on the Mideast Order were: Crawford, Mercer, Somerset, Erie, and Indiana withmilk production equal to 51.7 percent of the total pounds of milk pooled from Pennsylvania in September 2005. These same five counties topped milk production in September 2004 with 51.1 percent of all milk pooled from Pennsylvania.

The Mideast Orderhad seven pool distributing plants and one supply plantlocated in Pennsylvania in September. These plants pooled 146.1 million pounds of milk with Class I utilization of 55.7% for the month. This compares to 135.2m illion pounds of milk and a Class I utilization of 53.7% in Septem ber 2004.

Fifteen Pennsylvania manufacturing plants received either diverted or transferred pooled milk product in Septem ber of 2005.
