#### USDA Announces Final Rule to Amend All Federal Milk Orders

The U. S. Department of Agriculture announced publication of a final rule to amend all federal milk m arketing orders. This amendment implements provisions included in the Milk R egulatory Equity A  $\alpha$  (S. 2120), signed into law on April 11, that amends the Agricultural Marketing Agreement Act of 1937. In passing the amendments, the congressional intentis to "ensure equity between and among all dairy farmers and handlers for sales of packaged fluid milk in federally regulated milk m arketing areas and into certain non-federally regulated milk m arketing areas from federally regulated areas, and for other purposes.

The amended sections of the orders, which became effective May 1, include:

- ? Require fluid milk handlers located in federa lmilk m arketing order areas as described on the date of enactment, but not regulated by any federalmilk m arketing order, to pay federal order minimum prices to the federal order where the handler is physically located forsales of packaged fluid milk into nonfederally regulated marketing areas located within one or more states that require handlers to pay minimum prices for milk:
- ? Partially or fully regulate any producer-handler that has total distribution of Class I products of own-farm production in excess of three-million pounds and distributes fluidmilk in the Arizona-Las Vegas marketing order area;
- ? Remove the state of Nevada from the marketing area definition of any federal order; and
- ??Remove the regulatory exemption for handlers located in Clark County, Nevada.

## USDA Announce Final Rule to Permanently Amend the Mideast Milk Order

The U.S. Department of Agriculture announced a fin alrule that permanently adopts amendments to the pooling provisions of the Mideast milk marketing order that were previously implemented on an interim basis. This decision is based on testimony and evidence given at a public hearing held at Wooster, Ohio on March 7-10, 2005.

The permanently adopted amendments: 1) Prohibit the ability to simultaneously pool the same milk on the Mideast Federal milk order

and on a marketwide equalization pool administered by another government entity; 2) Lower the diversion limit standards; and 3) Increase the performance standards for supply plants.

Producers approved the amendments in a referendum conducted in response to the partial final decision, which was issued January 17, 2006. The final rule took effect May 1, 2006.

#### March Milk Production Up 5.5 Percent

Milk production in the 23 major States during March totaled 14.6 billion pounds, up 5.5 percent from M arch 2005. February revised production, at 13.0 billion pounds, was up 5.9 percent from February 2005.

Production per cow in the 23 major States averaged 1,733 pounds for March, 66 pounds above March 2005.

The number of milk cows on farms in the 23 major States was 8.22 million head, 124,000 head more than March 2005, and 17,000 head more than February 2006.

The Mideast Marketing Area has four states represented in the 23 major states used above. They are Indiana, Michigan, Ohio, and Pennsylvania. Milk production in these Mideast states during February totaled 23 billion pounds, up 123 million pounds or 5.8 percent from M arch 2005.

Production per cow in the Mideast states averaged 1,731 pounds for March, 70 pounds above March 2005.

The number of cows on farms in the Mideast states was 1.3 million head, 13,000 head more than March 2005.

#### **ORDER 33 MARKET SUMMARY**

The Producer Price Differential for the Mideast Marketing Area for April 2006 was \$0.82 and the Statistical Uniform Price was \$11.75 for the month. The Statistical Uniform Price is \$0.61 lower than last month, and is \$3.01 lower than April 2005.

The Producer Butterfat Price of \$1.2343 per pound decreased 2.53 cents from M arch 2006 and is down 4621 cents from a year ago. The Protein Price of \$1.9238 is up 4.02 cents from last month and is down 78.17 cents from April 2005. The Other Solids Price in April was \$0.1508 per pound, a decrease from last month's price of \$0.1874 and an increase of 4.88 cents from last April. The Somatic C ell Adjustment rate for March was \$0.00058.

April producer receipts of 1.51 billion pounds were 2.0 percent lower than March 2006, and 3.0 percent higher than April 2005 production of 1.47 billion pounds. Producer milk allocated to Class I accounted for 34.2 percent of the total producer milk in April 2006, less than the 37.9 percent in March 2006 and less than the 36.5 percent in April 2005. A total of 8,710 producers were pooled on the Mideast Order compared to 9,847 producers pooled in April 2005.

The market average content of producer milk was as follows: Butterfat 3.69%; Protein 3.01%; Other Solids 5.73% and Nonfat Solids 8.74%.

#### USDA Seeks Nominees for National Dairy Board

The U.S. Department of Agriculture is asking dairy producer and farm organizations to nominate candidates to serve on the National Dairy Promotion and Research Board. Nominations must be submitted by May 31.

The Secretary of Agriculture will appoint 12 in dividuals from those nominated to succeed members whose terms expire October 31, 2006. The 12 new members will serve 3-year terms beginning November 1, 2006, and ending October 31, 2009.

USDA will accept nomin ations from the following regions: Region 1 (Oregon and Washington); Region 2 (California); Region 3 (Arizona, Colorado, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, Utah, and Wyoming); Region 4 (Arkansas, Kansas, New Mexico, Okahoma, and Texas); Region 5 (Minnesota, North Dakota, and South Dakota); Region 6 (Wisconsin); Region 7 (Illinois, Iowa, Missouri, and Nebraska); Region 9 (Indiana, Michigan, Ohio, and West Virginia); Region 11 (Delaware, Maryland, New Jersey, and Pennsylvania); and Region 12 (New York). USDA will appoint one member per region, with the exception of Region 2 (California) and Region 6 (Wisconsin) with two appointments each.

The National Dairy Promotion and Research Board was established under the Dairy Production Stabilization Act of 1983 to develop and administera coordinated program of promotion, research, and nutrition education. The 36-mem berboard is authorized to design programs to strengthen the dairy industry's position in domestic and foreign markets. The national program is financed by a mandatory 15-cent per hundred weight assessment on all milkmarketed commercially by dairy producers.



#### 2005 Mailbox Milk Prices for Selected Reporting Areas in Federal Milk Orders and California

For 2005, mailbox prices for selected reporting areas in Federalmilk orders averaged \$14.98 per cwt., \$0.92 lower than the all-area average reported for 2004. The component tests of producer milk in 2005 averaged: butterfat, 3.67%; protein, 3.04%; and, other solids, 5.70%. On an individual reporting area basis, mailbox prices decreased from the record high levels in 2004 in all areas. Florida had the highest average price in 2005, \$17.58; New Mexico had the low estaverage, \$13.23. During the year, mailbox prices peaked in January, generally decreased through June, generally increased through October, and then decreased through the end of the year. Monthly all area averages ranged from \$15.89 in January to \$14.13 in June.

The Mideast Marketing Area has the states of Indiana, Michigan, and Ohiolisted individually in these totals. Pennsylvania was included in the Northeast Federal MilkOrder totals. In diana's 2005 mailbox price averaged \$15.03 perc wt. This is a decrease of \$1.00 from 2004's average of \$16.03 perc wt. Michigan's 2005 mailbox price averaged \$14.78 per cwt. The price decreased \$0.80 from 2004's price of \$15.58 per c wt. Ohio's 2005 mailbox price averaged \$15.06 per c wt. The 2004 price averaged \$15.92 per c wt or \$0.86 more than 2005's price of \$15.06.

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
