Mideast Market Administrator's

Federal Order No. 33

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The U. S. Department of Agriculture announced a final rule that permanently adopts amendments to the pooling provisions of the Mideast milk m arketing order. These amendments were previously discussed in a recommended decision. This rule is based on testimony and evidence given at a public hearing held in Wooster, Ohio, from March 7-10, 2005.

The permanently adopted amendments: establish a limit on the volume of m ik a handlermay pool during the months of April through February to 115 percent of the volume of milk pooled in the prior month; and establish a limit on the volume of m ik a handlermay pool during the month of March to 120 percent of the volume of m ik pooled in the prior month.

These amendments will assist in identifying the milk of those producers who regularly and consistently service the fluid needs of the marketand subsequently have all of their milk pooled and priced under the order.

A majority of producers that pool on the Mideast order approved these amendments which become effective December 1,2006. The final rule appeared in the October 30th Federal Register. For additional information about the decision contact this office.

USDA Announces Final Rule to Amend Central Milk Order

The U. S. Department of Agriculture announced a final rule to permanently adopt a mendments to the pooling provisions of the Central milk m arketing order. This decision is based on testimony and evidence given at a public hearing held at Kansas City, Missouri, December 6-8,2004.

The adopted amendments increase supply plant performance standards, a mend features of the "touch-base" provision, amend certain features of the "split plant" provision and decrease the diversion limit standards of the order. The decision also adopts a proposal that limits the volume of milk a handler can pool in a month to 125 percent of the total volume of milk pooled in the previous month.

These amendments will assist in identifying the milk of those producers who regularly and consistently service the fluid needs of the marketand subsequently have all of their milk pooled and priced under the order.

More than the required number of producers for the Central marketing

order approved the final order amendments which become effective December 1, 2006. The final rule appeared in the October 30^{th} Federal Register.

USDA Announces Final Rule to Amend Upper Midwest Milk Order

The U. S. Department of Agriculture announced a final rule that permanently adopts amendments to the pooling provisions of the Upper Midwest milk marketing order. This rule is based on testimony and evidence given at a public hearing held in Blooming ton, Minnesota, August 16-19, 2004.

The permanently adopted amendments: establish a limit on the volum e ofm 1 k a handlermay pool during the months of April through February to 125 percent of the volume of milk pooled in the prior month; establish a limit on the volume ofm 1 k a handler may pool during the month of March to 135 percent of the volume of 1 k pooled in the prior month; and allow the market admin is trator to increase the maximum administrative assessment up to 8 cents per hundred weight on all pooled milk if necessary to maintain the required fund reserves.

These amendments will assist in identifying the milk of those producers who regularly and consistently service the fluid needs of the marketand subsequently have all of their milk pooled and priced under the order.

A majority of producers pooled on the Upper Midw est order approved these amendments which become effective December 1, 2006. The final rule appeared in the October 30th *Federal Register*.

ORDER 33 MARKET SUMMARY

The Producer Price Differential for the Mideast Marketing Area for October 2006 was \$0.59 and the Statistical Uniform Price was \$1291 for the month. The Statistical Uniform Price is the \$0.51 higher than last month, and is \$2.00 lower than October 2005.

The Producer Butterfat Price of \$1.4149 per pound decreased 0.42 cents from September 2006 and is down 4107 cents from a year ago. The Protein Price of \$2.0775 is down 5.71 cents from last month and is down 30.05 cents from October 2005. The Other Solids Price in October was \$0.2026 per pound, an increase from last month's price of \$0.1649 and an increase of 5.35 cents from last October. The Somatic Cell Adjustment rate for October was \$0.00064.

October producer receipts of 135 billion pounds were 7.1 percent higher than September 2006, and 72 percent lower than October 2005 production of 145 billion pounds. Producer milk allocated to Class I accounted for 42.4 percent of the total producer milk in October 2006, less than the 45.9 percent in September 2006 and more than the 389 percent in October 2005. A total of 7875 producers were pooled on the Mideast Order compared to 8938 producers pooled in October 2005.

The market average content of producer milk was as follows: Butterfat 3.78%; Protein 3.12%; Other Solids 5.70% and Nonfat Solids 8.82%.

September Milk Production Up 2.0 Percent

Milk production in the 23 major States during September totaled 133 billion pounds, up 2 percent from September 2005. August production, unrevised at 139 billion pounds, is up 16 percent from August 2005. Production per cow in the 23 major States averaged 1,615 pounds for Septem ber, 16 pounds above September 2005. The number of milk cows on farms in the 23 major States was 8.25 million head, 79,000 head more than September 2005, but 6,000 head less than August 2006.

The Mideast Marketing Area has four states represented in the 23 major states used above. They are Indiana, Michigan, Ohio, and Pennsylvania. Milk production in these Mideast states during September totaled 2.1 billion pounds, up 71 million pounds or 35 percent from September 2005.

Production per cow in the Mideast states averaged 1,600 pounds for September, 29 pounds above September 2005. The number of cows on farms in the Mideast states was 1.3m illion head, 11,000 head more than September 2005.

Release Dates for 2007 Federal Milk Order Price Data

Listed below are the release dates for the Federalmilk order program for price data applicable to January through December 2007. The advance pricing factors will be released on the Friday before the 23rd of the preceding month unless this date is a Friday. Likewise, the class and component prices will be released on the Friday before the 5th of the following month unless this date is a Friday. The release time for all release dates, except November 23, is 10:00 a.m. EST/EDST; for November 23, the release time is 2:00 p.m. EST.
