Mideast Market Administrator's Rederal Order No. 33

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USDA Hearing on Proposed Amendments to All Federal Milk Orders to Reconvene

The national public hearing to consider proposals seeking to amend the Class III and Class IV product price formulas applicable to all Federalmilk m arketing orders will reconvene on April 9, 2007. The hearing will begin at 1.00 p m. at the Radisson City C entre H otel, 31 West Ohio Street, Indianapolis, Indiana 46204. The hearing was initially convened on February 26 through March 2 in S trong sville, Ohio.

USDA requested proposals from the industry that would examine all features of the Class III and Class IV product price formulas. Both producer cooperatives and milk product manufacturers submitted proposals.

Anyone interested in participating in the hearing should notify a USDA official upon arrival. The hearing notice and additional information is available from this office.

January Milk Production Up 1.4 Percent

Milk production in the 23 major States during January totaled 14.2 billion pounds, up 1.4 percent from January 2006. December production, at 14.0 billion pounds, was up 2.8 percent from December 2005.

Production percow in the 23 major States averaged 1,719 pounds for January, 8 pounds above January 2006. The number of cows on farms in the 23 major States was 8.28 million head, 81,000 head more than January 2006, and 3,000 head more than December 2006.

The Mideast Marketing Area has four states represented in the 23 major states used above. They are Indiana, Michigan, Ohio, and Pennsylvania. Milk production in these Mideast states during January totaled 2.2 billion pounds, up 32 million pounds or 1.5 percent from January 2006.

Production percow in the Mideast states averaged 1,701 pounds for January, 14 pounds above January 2006. The number of cows on farms in the Mideast states was 1.3 m illion head, 9,000 head more than January 2006.

The Dairy Outlook

Forecast milk production for 2007 is 184.3 billion pounds, up 1.4 percent from the 181.8 billion pound total estimated for 2006. Cow numbers are expected to decline slightly in 2007, averaging 9,085 thousand head for the year. The decline is tempered from earlier expectations. Production percow continues to rise and will likely reach 20,280 pounds in 2007. Highercom and alfalfa prices have depressed the milk-to-feed price ratio despite the considerably higher milk prices expected in 2007.

According to January's Livestock Slaughter report, dairy cattle

slaughter for the January to D ecember 2006 period was 4 percent a bove that of 2005. In contrast, the January *Cattle* report indicated dairy farmers had 4.31 million replacement heifers on hand on January 1, slightlym one than 1 percent above 2006. Replacement heifers per 100 cows are about the same as last year, and the January dairy cow price reported in *Agricultural Prices* is well below 2006, implying that heifers are more available. The increase in replacement heifers, coupled with higher cow slaughter, may suggest that producers are responding to low er milk-to-feed price ratios by replacing less productive cows. Such a response would help low er feed costs per unit of milk.

Dem and for daiy products remains robust, especially for dry products. Cheese prices are forecast to climb in 2007 to \$1.320 to \$1.390 per pound. Sales increases are expected in all sectors of the restaurant industry. Butter production in 2006 was the highest since 1962. Increased milk production should keep butterproduction up in 2007. Butterprices should be slightly higher in 2007. How ever, price increases for this productare un likely to be as strong as for other products since supplies are ample. Butterprice is expected to average \$1.235 to \$1.335 per pound in 2007.

There is exception aldemand forn on fat drym ilk (NDM), skim and whole milk powders (SMP/WMP), and whey. Export demand is strong because many major markets, such as Mexico and Algeria, maintain feeding programs for their populations and are cash rich from petroleum sales. Dom estic dry product demand remains strong on the same fundamentals that are supporting cheese demand since dry products are also used in food manufacturing.

ORDER 33 MARKET SUMMARY

The Producer Price Differential for the Mideast Marketing Area for February 2007 was \$0.05 and the Statistical Uniform Price was \$14.23 for the month. The Statistical Uniform Price is \$0.20 higher than last month, and is \$0.95 higher than February 2006.

The Producer Butterfat Price of \$1.3112 per pound increased 1.03 cents from January 2007 and is down 3.57 cents from a yearago. The Protein Price of \$ 2.4125 is up 0.72 cents from last month and is up 29.05 cents from February 2006. The Other Solids Price in February was \$0.4170 per pound, an increase from last month's price of \$0.3183 and an increase of 21.71 cents from last February. The Somatic Cell Adjustment rate for February was \$0.00067.

February producer receipts of 128 billion pounds were 13.2 percent low er than January 2007, and 8.1 percent lower than February 2006 production of 1.39 billion pounds. Producer milk allocated to Class I accounted for 416 percent of the total producer milk in February 2007, more than the 39.9 percent in January 2007 and more than the 37.7 percent in February 2006. A totalof7,788 producers were pooled on the Mideast Order compared to 8,633 producers pooled in February 2006.

The market average content of producer milk w as as follows: Butterfat 3.78%; Protein 3.11%; Other Solids 5.70% and Nonfat Solids 8.81%.

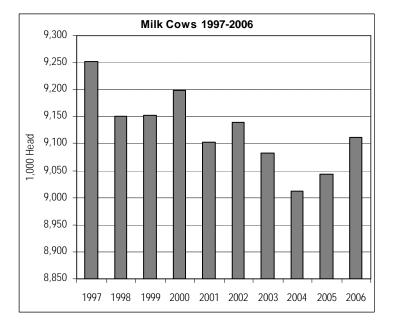
2006 Annual Milk Production Up 2.8 Percent from 2005

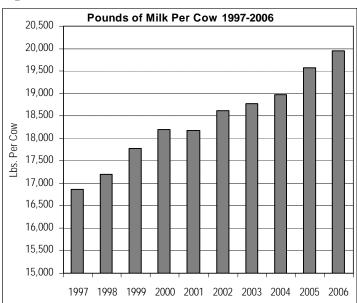
The annual production of milk for the U.S. during 2006 was 182 billion pounds, 2.8 percentabove 2005. Revisions to 2005 production decreased the annual tota160 million pounds. Revised 2006 production was down slightly from last month's publication. Production percow in the U.S. averaged 19,951 pounds for2006, 386 pounds above 2005. The average annual rate of milk production per cow has increased 18.3 percent from 1997.

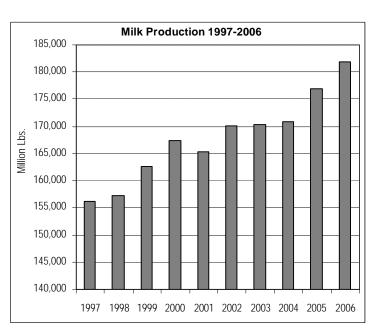
The average number of milk cows on farms in the U.S. during 2006 was 9.11 million head, up 0.8 percent from 2005. The average number of milk cows was revised up 2,000 head for 2005, and down 3,000 head for 2006.

Milk production in the Mideast Marketing Area states of Indiana, Michigan, Ohio, and Pennsylvania during 2006, totaled 26.0 billion pounds, up 839 million pounds or 3.3 percent from 2005.

Production percow in the Mideast states averaged 19,827 pounds for 2006, 273 pounds above 2005. The number of cows on farms in the Mideast states was 1.3m illion head, 14,000 head more than 2005.
