

The U.S. Department of Agriculture announced that it will reconvene a national public hearing to consider proposals seeking to amend the Class III and Class IV product price formulas applicable to all Federal milk marketing orders. The hearing will begin at 1.00 p.m. on July 9 at the Sheraton Station Square Hotel, 300 West Station Square Drive, Pittsburgh, Pa., 15219-1122, telephone: (412)261-2000.

The public hearing began on February 26, 2007, in Strongsville, Ohio, and initially reconvened on April 9, 2007, in Indianapolis, Indiana. The purpose of reconvening this proceeding is to receive additional testimony on proposed amendments 1 th rough 20 as published in the original hearing notice on February 9, 2007, and the supplemental notice of hearing on February 20, 2007, in the *Federal Register*.

USDA Sets Hearing on Proposed Amendments to the Appalachian, Florida and Southeast Federal Milk Orders

The U.S. Department of Agriculture announced that it will hold a public hearing to consider proposals to amend the Appalachian, Florida, and Southeast Orders. The hearing will begin at 1:00 p.m. on Monday, May, 21, 2007, at the Shera ton Suites Tampa Airport, 4400 W. Cypress Street, Tampa, Florida 33607.

The proposals seek to amend the Appalachian, Florida, and Southeast Orders by temporarily adjusting the Class I pricing surface for each county within each of the three milk marketing orders until such time that USDA is able to comprehensively address the Class I pricing surface on a national scale. Proposals also include changing the diversion percentage limits, the producer delivery days, and the transportation credit provisions of the Appalachian and Southeast orders. Other proposals would change the maximum rates for each of the three orders the market administrator may charge for the administration of the orders from 5 cents perhundredweight to as much as 8 cents perhundredweight.

The hearing notice was published as a proposed rule in the May 8th Federal Register. USDA Seeks Nominees for National Dairy Board

The U.S. Department of Agriculture is asking dairy producer and farm organizations to nominate candidates to serve on the National Dairy Promotion and Research Board. Nominations must be submitted by May 31.

The Secretary of Agriculture will appoint 12 individuals from those nominated to succeed members whose terms expireO ctober 31, 2007. The 12 new members will serve 3-year terms beginning November. 1,2007, and ending October 31, 2010.

USDA will accept nominations from the following regions: Region 1 (Oregon and Washing ton); Region 2 (California); Region 3 (Arizona, Colorado, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, Utah, and Wyoming); Region 4 (Arkansas, Kansas, New Mexico, Oklahoma, and Texas); Region 6 (Wisconsin); Region 9 (Indiana, Michigan, Ohio, and West Virginia); Region 10 (Florida, Georgia, North Carolina, South Carolina, and Virginia); Region 11 (Delaware, Maryland, New Jersey, and Pennsylvania); and Region 12 (New York). USDA will appoint one memberperregion, with the exception of Region 2 (California) with four appointments.

The National Dairy Promotion and Research Board was established under the Dairy Production Stabilization Act of 1983 to develop and administera coordinated program of promotion, research, and nutrition education. The 36-member board is authorized to design programs to strengthen the dairy industry's position in domestic and foreign markets. The national program is financed by a mandatory 15-cent per hundred weight assessment on all milkmarketed commercially by dairy producers.

ORDER 33 MARKET SUMMARY

The Producer Price Differential for the Mideast Marketing Area for April 2007 was \$0.00 and the Statistical Uniform Price was \$16.09 for the month. The Statistical Uniform Price is the \$097 higher than last month, and is \$4.34 higher than April 2006.

The Producer Butterfat Price of \$1.4657 per pound increased 8.88 cents from M arch 2007 and is up 23.14 cents from a year ago. The Protein Price of \$2.5212 is up 8.83 cents from last month and is up 59.74 cents from April 2006. The Other Solids Price in April was \$0.6008 per pound, an increase from last month's price of \$0.5257 and an increase of 45.0 cents from last April. The Somatic Cell Adjustment rate for April was \$0.00071.

April producer receipts of 1.42 billion pounds were 1.1 percent lower than March 2007, and 64 percent lower than April 2006 production of 1.51 billion pounds. Producer milk allocated to Class I accounted for 37.5 percent of the total producer milk in April 2007, less than the 41.0 percent in March 2007 and more than the 34.2 percent in April 2006. A total of 7,789 producers were pooled on the Mideast Order compared to 8,710 producers pooled in April 2006.

The market average content of producer milk w as as follows: Butterfat 3.66%; Protein 3.04%; Other Solids 5.71% and Nonfat Solids 8.75%.

March Milk Production Up 1.1 Percent

Milk production in the 23 major States during March totaled 14.8 billion pounds, up 1.1 percent from March 2006. February production, revised at 13.1 billion pounds, was up 0.6 percent from February 2006. The February revision represented a decrease of 31 million pounds or 02 percent from last month's preliminary production estimate.

Production per cow in the 23 major States averaged 1,782 pounds for March, 7 pounds above March 2006.

The number of milk cows on farms in the 23 major States was 8.28 million head, $58,\!000$ head more than March 2006, and $5,\!000$ head more than February 2007.

The Mideast Marketing Area has four states represented in the 23 major states used above. They are Indiana, Michigan, Ohio, and Pennsylvania. Milk production in these Mideast states during March totaled 2.3 billion pounds, up 32 million pounds or 1.4 percent from March 2006.

Production per cow in the Mideast states averaged 1,740 pounds for March,5 pounds above March 2006.

The number of cows on farms in the Mideast states was 1.3m illion head, 11,000 head more than March 2006.

Johanns Appoints Dairy Research and Promotion Board Member

Agriculture SecretaryM ike Johannsannounced the appointment of Paul Broering, St. Henry, Ohio, to the National Dairy R esearch and Promotion B oard. Broering will fill the Region 9 board position that became vacant in 2006. His term will end October 31, 2007.

The National Dairy Prom otion and Research Board, composed of 36 dairy farmers representing 13 regions of the contiguous United States, administers a coordinated program of promotion, research and nutrition education.

The board was established by the Dairy Production Stabilization Act of 1983. It is authorized to design programs to strengthen the dairy industry's position in domestic and foreign markets. The national program is financed by a mandatory 15-cent per hundred weight assessment on milk produced in the contiguous 48 states and marketed commercially by dairy farmers. USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service monitors the operation of the board.

AMS encourages all eligible individuals to participate in its committee and board activities. It is USDA's policy that membership on industry-governed boards and committees accurately reflect the diversity of individuals served by the programs.

National Econometric Model Documentation Released

Dairy Programs' Office of the Chief Economist maintains a dynamic econometric model of the U.S. dairy industry. Released April 2007, this paper documents an econometric model used by USDA-AMSD airy Programs to support its economic analysis and forecasting responsibilities. The model is comprehensive, including the supply of milk, the allocation of butterfatand nonfatsolids to fluid milk and the major manufactured dairy products, and consumer demand for milk and dairy products. 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
